Date Early 8th century B.C. Opinions vary widely (from 900 to 400

B.C.) with little internal evidence. Joel was often placed with Hosea and Amos because it was believed he wrote during that time. Assyria, Babylon, and Persia are not mentioned. Tyre and Sidon were more

powerful then.

Theme The Day of the Lord

Message The final judgment of the Lord nears, so call on the

name of the Lord and be saved from God's wrath.

Key Issue What are the locusts of chapter 2?

1. Chapter 2 describes a literal locust plague (either the same or a subsequent plague as chapter 1)
